Reader: The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light. They lived in a land of shadows, but now

light is shining on them.

We light this candle to remind us of the hope of all people for a Saviour who will bring us freedom and peace. This hope was promised by the prophets of the Old Testament, who shared their vision of

justice coming to the earth by the mighty acts of God.



A Reading from the Letter of Paul to the Church in Rome.


Besides this, you know what time it is, how it is now the moment for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we became believers; the night is far gone, the day is near. Let us then lay aside the works of darkness and put on the armour of light; let us live honourably as in the day, not in revelling and drunkenness, not in debauchery and licentiousness, not in quarrelling and jealousy. Instead, put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires.

The Holy Gospel: Matthew 24:36-44
Reader: The Lord be with you.

People: And also with you.

Reader: The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

People: Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

But about that day and hour no one knows, neither the angels of heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. For as the days of Noah were, so will be the coming of the Son of Man. For as in those days before the flood they were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, until the day Noah entered the ark, and they knew nothing until the flood came and swept them all away, so too will be the coming of the Son of Man. Then two will be in the field; one will be taken and one will be left. Two women will be grinding meal together; one will be taken and one will be left. ways, to the glory of your name. Amen.

Wakened by the solemn warning, let the earth-bound soul arise; Christ our sun, all sloth dispelling, shines upon the morning skies.


Lo, the Lamb, so long expected, comes with pardon down from heaven; Let us all, with deep repentance, pray that we may be forgiven,

People: (verse 3) Glory to you, O Lord; glory for evermore! Glory, glory, glory to you!


The Presiding Celebrant concludes the Eucharistic Prayer, and at the elevation of the bread and cup, we sing verse 4 of the Sanctus:

Presider: As our Saviour taught us, let us pray:




The Breaking of the Bread
