In addition to providing support to clergy who are in need, the fund administers the W.R. Kay Bursaries, awarded each year to men and women completing religious studies leading to ordination.*

Social Justice Vestry Motion 2024: Protecting and Advancing the Right to Housing

We, the parish of St Georges on-the-Hill, call on all levels of government to take the following measures to protect and advance the human right to housing:

- We call on the Government of Canada to ensure that federal subsidies and incentives are targeted to those developers and projects that demonstrably address housing need and uphold the human right to housing by meeting clear conditions on affordable rents, non-displacement policies and eviction prevention measures.
- We call on the Government of Canada to end the favourable tax treatment of Real Estate Investment Trusts (REITs) and tax them at the regular corporate rate, with resulting revenues being directed toward the creation and preservation of affordable housing.
- We call on the Province of Ontario to enact rent controls and vacancy controls on all rental housing and put restrictions on Above Guideline Rent Increases.
- We call on the Province of Ontario to work with municipal governments to enact and enforce restrictions on short-term rentals to protect rental housing stock.

MINUTES OF 2023 VESTRY MEETING

St. George's on-the-Hill

2023 Vestry Meeting Minutes

19. Welcome

21. The Year in Pictures

Due to technical difficulties, the Year in Pictures was not available.

22. Election of Vestry Clerk

24. Acceptance of Congregational Life Reports

Motion to accept the Congregational Life Report, which was distributed prior to the meeting and is available to all.

25. Presentation of the 2022 Financial Report

Donations to general operations were up almost 3 per cent thanks to seasonal appeal and specific outreach initiatives. Regular donations continue to decline. This is consistent with other churches throughout the pandemic.

The church ended the year with an operating surplus of \$37,710 before a transfer of \$35,000 to Capital for a net operating surplus of \$2,710.

Thanks to continued strong support for Outreach, the church was able to distribute \$30,335 in financial assistance and donated goods.

Due to a drop in both fixed income and equity markets, the church experienced unrealized losses of \$123,338 vs unrealized gains in 2021 of \$59,662. However, we have accumulated net unrealized gains of \$143,982 in total investments with a market value of \$1,462,689 split fairly evenly between the church and cemetery.

Funds at the church are split into three categories – operating, restricted funds and capital improvements. The closing balance for all funds at the church was \$2,705,117. Distribution of the funds was pretty much the same as last year.

Question: Could you clarify the amount set aside in the capital fund (\$35,000 and \$25,000 set aside).
Answer: There is \$140,000 set aside for renovations.

David Dougall questioned this amount and Linda Javorski corrected her comment to say that, after the transfer of \$35,000, that the amount available in the Capital Fund to be spent is \$175,000 and change.

A motion was made to approve the financial report for 2022.

26. Presentation of the 2023 Operating Budget

Facilities expenses were \$223,451 last year and the plan for 2023 is to increase that to \$237,676.

Recovery costs from KCS was \$201,321 and is budgeted at \$214,124 in 2023.

Total church facilities expense for last year was \$93,246 and will increase to \$100,792 for 2023. The increase is partially due to an increase in cleaning because of issues hiring people to clean as well as other increased costs due to full time usage and inflation.

Total Parish expenditures are going from \$576,741 to \$612,717.

Every July the rent from KCS goes up based on inflation. A portion is set aside for capital because we are in an aging building.

Donations have been going down about \$5,000 a year because of reduced numbers due to our aging parishioners. The good news is that we have a number of new parishioners through the Youth Group, Pints of View and Messy Church.

Expecting \$13,000 through targeted Outreach activities.

We are looking at a balanced budget by the end of the year.

28. Capital Projects

The church is 180 years old and we have an obligation to keep it maintained. Last year, six church flat roofs were replaced; St. Hilda's Room and the Godly Play Room were renovated and new furniture purchased; the Sacristy was completed and a deposit made on a Vestment Cabinet which is expected to be delivered and installed next week; completed waterproofing for the basement of the Rectory; and undertook a Conditions Study of the facilities to determine anticipated repairs for the next 10 years.

29. Plans for 2023

Capital projects for the coming year include exterior painting and repairs as needed to all of the sills under the stained-glass windows; upgrading the landscaping on the south side of the sanctuary (for which money was left to the church); and updating and re-costing renovation plans for Luxton Hall Kitchen and washrooms.

Janet Kincaid provided an update for Outreach. She talked about how proud she was to fill a full pallet last fall with food donations from the church to the Food Bank. Out of the Cold dinners were fully supported at St. Margaret's and All Saints'.

There was a reminder that Lenten Shoe Bags of Toiletries for Jean Tweed Centre have to be handed in by the last Sunday of March.

She mentioned how successful the Prayer Shawl, Mitten Tree and Pints of View have been.

There was a reminder that volunteering at Brands for Canada (Mary and Martha) is taking place this month.

Dorothy Ley Hospice is looking at trying to support the homeless community in addition to its existing services. It has started an ambulatory clinic to serve the homeless. The executive director at the Hospice is looking at ways to partner with long-term care facilities and other groups to expand palliative services in our community. Three upcoming events include Hike in May, Healing Cycle and 70s Night in September.

Question: Mary-Anne Rodgers suggested that when the Parish is involved in Outreach activities, it would be a good idea to enhance their promotion at the start of the service. She recommended that rather than the Wardens saying something, the church have the people directly connected with the organization or those organizing the Outreach activity do the promotion, such as Ted Rouse talking about the Scout's Christmas tree sales.

Answer: Duly noted. Rousing applause from the Vestry attendees.

Max Maréchaux mentioned he had a Talent Auction folder that covered a number of years of Auctions. The last one netted about \$15,000. Under Linda’s budget, there was zero indicated for fundraising. Max said, “Imagine the difference we could make by adding \$15,000.” The event is proposed for November when KCS is on a school break. The idea is to involve all sections of the church such as Youth Group, Pints of View, Wednesday morning and night groups etc. Max asked for a show of hands for those who are interested in such an event. There was strong support for the event. Max then asked for volunteers who would help organize the event.

THE COLLEGE OF BISHOPS' PASTORAL LETTER TO VESTRIES 2024

To the clergy, churchwardens, and parishioners of the Diocese of Toronto,

Dear friends,

Followers of Jesus, inspired by the Holy Spirit, serve the world God loves.

Simple and elegant. These few words capture the essence of a Vision that we have been pursuing and discerning throughout the Cast the Net process, a visioning exercise that began while we were still in pandemic mode. Over the course of several consultations, we listened to one another, and for the leading of the Holy Spirit. With time, sifting and testing, 20 Calls were revealed at Synod, which were supported with enthusiasm. A final version of the Calls will be received by Synod Council in February. We continue to be grateful to the Steering Committee and consultants, who have led our work together over the past 18 months. And now the work begins to incorporate these Calls into the life and ministry of the whole Diocese. This is the time for parishes large and small, missions, ministries, committees and Synod Council to animate the Calls in our own contexts. It is almost impossible for one community to embrace all twenty, but by serving together from Mississauga to Brighton, Midland to Minden, and all points in between, we can!

We begin this journey with a Season of Spiritual Renewal. We embrace the Call to deepen our walk together as communities by immersing ourselves in prayer, reading and reflection on scripture, worship and sharing our stories of faith with one another. As we promised in our baptism: we will “continue in the apostles’ teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread, and in the prayers”. This Season will be supported by the Rev. Canon Dr Judy Paulsen, members of a steering committee and the College of Bishops. We hope that you will be able to join us for Diocesan worship events, learning opportunities, programs and fellowship that entice us all to walk more closely in the footsteps of Jesus.

We are delighted to reach across our borders to deepen our friendship with the Diocese of Brasilia. Brasilia is a relatively new diocese, birthed in 1985, with a small number of parishes, missions and ministries. We were delighted to welcome their Bishop Mauricio Andrade and his wife Sandra to our Diocesan Synod in November. We will learn from, grow with, and support one another as we strive to serve Christ in our unique circumstances. And we look forward to opportunities for delegations of our clergy and laity to visit back and forth, both in-person and online, as we deepen our affection for one another.

We are proud of and amazed at the ministry taking place across our Diocese, especially in the areas of youth, ecumenism, creation care, diversity, and faith formation. We encourage you to consider this year's Diocesan Social Justice motion on housing, and to prayerfully support our Church's advocacy for every person's right to adequate shelter. We are convinced that the Holy Spirit is leading and guiding us, and challenging us to bravely find new ways to work and worship together, to increase in courage, to share our passion for the Good News of Jesus, and to seek and find new meaning as followers of Christ in the 21st century, where we are confronted with emerging economic and social challenges. We want to express our heartfelt thanks to all who make up our dynamic community of faith – lay people, deacons, priests – all helping to give a glimpse of the Reign of God as it unfolds in our midst.

As your bishops, we know the joy and privilege of serving the Church in this Diocese. We thank all those who have joined us in giving leadership over the past year. We have recently celebrated one year of our new diocesan leadership model, and we are immensely grateful to our new Territorial Archdeacons and Canon Administrator for stepping into their roles so effectively and with such faithfulness. The five of them have helped to ease the bishops' administrative load, allowing us to focus on some of the other work to which we have been called and ordained.

Whether your work is changing this year, whether you are stepping out of your role at this Vestry meeting, or stepping into a new ministry, or continuing on in your good work, please know that we are here to support you in every way we can. We want to encourage you in Gospel ministry, in the initiatives and relationships that you are building, as you cast your nets ever wider in a world that is hungry for Christ - for meaning, connection and belonging.

A few highlights:

Liturgy and Worship

2023 was the first year since 2019 when we were able to worship in person for the entirety of the year. How wonderful it was to be able to experience that again! And so, many thanks to all who contribute to that experience: to Stephanie and the Chancel Guild; to Ran and the choir; to the acolytes, readers, and intercessors; and to the sidespeople.

Another way in which the church has been present is through our ministry to Senior's Homes in the area. For many years each month I have visited Kingsway Retirement Home and Delmanor Prince Edward for a service of Holy Communion. Sadly, the Delmanor service discontinued due to a lack of attendees, but the staff are monitoring things there with a mind to recommencing.

It has also been a privilege to support a small group of parishioners who regularly pray for the programmes and people of St George's. This group continues to uphold us all in their prayers, both individually and as a group. The following projects mentioned in this report are just a few things of the many projects, repairs and replacements from 2023. I am planning to provide a comprehensive list at a later date.

Our major project at KCS this year was renovating the Art room. Our team of contractors on this project were: Altech Electrical, B&H Renovations (structural), D&D Mechanical (plumbing), and GL Industries (Mill Workers).

We are constantly evaluating and renegotiating our contracts and trades relationships for the benefits of quality and cost. This is why we brought in Oltion Qejvani, an electrician from Altech. I can't say enough about him – dedicated and true to his word, always there when you need him.

Two years ago, we hired CDW Engineering to inspect our properties, and have since managed to repair or replaced many deficiencies at Kingsway College School, St. Georges Church, and the Rectory. In 2024, we hope to tackle the electrical panels both in the church and school. We have a total of six outdated panels that need to be replaced. This is where our electrician Oltion comes into play. He is working on quotes to help us through this tactical procedure.

We had B&H Renovation Inc. remove the old wooden windowsills from the church and replace them with concrete sills, and all the stained-glass windows were caulked.

St. George's has a new community garden. This has been a long time coming! To all that were involved in this project - thank you! Special thanks to the people that donated to this project. And thank you to Brian Danby and our contractor, Dimitri Lange from Landscape Link Inc., for making this happen.

In the next few years, we are looking forward to working with David Dougall on the kitchen, Luxton Hall and washroom renovations.

Once again, we have applied for the Canada Summer Jobs Program that is funded by the Federal Government. This funding will support three young individuals, and the experience gained will play a vital role in their future endeavors. We provide training for each student to help them through the working world. We are still waiting for approval from the government and should hear from them sometime in April.

Thank You

Thank you to Miguel Nobre who officially started with us in July 2023 and has taken over my previous position. Miguel brings a wealth of computer knowledge and skill, bringing us up to date with today's changing world of technology. Miguel previously worked four years as captain of our summer students in our Canada Summer Jobs Program.

I would like to mention that Father Michelle Childs Ward is no longer with the Parish. It has been a privilege to work with Father Michelle. I wish her and her husband John all the best in their future endeavors.

I also wish to mention I&B, our cleaning company, Boris Horciak, and his amazing crew. When unexpected situations arise, they react without any hesitation. They keep our school and church spotless.

I would like to thank everyone that was involved in maintaining this beautiful property of 4600 Dundas St West.

1ST ETOBICOKE SCOUTS REPORT

In the 2023 season, 1st Etobicoke enjoyed continued growth in our membership and now has an expanded Scout group with first, second and third-year Scouts for the first time in several years. 2023 brought healthy membership numbers, with more opportunities to focus on skills development at all ages, in addition to new camping experiences and our usual fundraising initiatives.

KINGSWAY COLLEGE SCHOOL (KCS) REPORT

Dear St. George's on-the-Hill Community,

Please find our KCS Annual Report for our 2022/23 school year on our school's website: <https://kcsorca.finalsite.com/about-us/publications>. We believe it will provide you with a comprehensive overview of what happened at KCS during the last school year.

The 2022/23 school year started with a bit of trepidation. Would COVID-19 disrupt in-person learning when all the students returned? Thankfully, this gave way to the more usual rhythms of school life returning, with hallways busy with energetic and happy students back at school. KCS was back to normal with clubs, teams, trips, electives, assemblies, the musical, fun fairs, and so much more. Our students enjoyed their first full year of learning and being part of the KCS community since the start of the pandemic. It seems so far away now, but it really did take a toll on everyone in our community, and I want to express gratitude and a deep sense of appreciation to the St. George's on-the-Hill community for your support throughout those years.

We continued to focus on identifying opportunities for deeper learning within the curriculum through projects and intentional programming that fosters friendships and connections across grades and subjects. Whether it's through our signature small-group literacy and numeracy classes that provide more time for students to engage directly with our experienced and knowledgeable faculty or our specialized learning spaces such as our newly renovated Art Room, every student at KCS is embraced and provided with an environment necessary to reach their ultimate potential. Special guests also enriched our learning throughout the year. Our younger students enjoyed dance and drumming workshops, and author and scientist visits. Faculty and students engaged in workshops about identity and belonging, project-based learning, cross-curricular and cross-campus programming. Our students continued to represent KCS with confidence in math contests, robotics tournaments, and athletic competitions.

The opening of the doors of our new Senior School campus this year was an incredible milestone and the fulfillment of a dream. It is also reflective of the continuous work and support of many in our community. Program enhancements, like our new campus and the renovation of our Junior School Art Room are two exciting and important investments in our school that will benefit KCS students now and for generations to come.

Construction of the Senior School continued until mid-January 2023, when 23,000 sq. ft. were fully opened for use at 2183 Lake Shore Blvd West. This included a large Market Place at the heart of the school, four standard classrooms, a Science Lab, a multi-purpose area, an Art Room, a Fitness Room, multiple meeting rooms, offices and a staff workspace. It is a beautiful interior that earned a first place Metamorphosis Award for interior design this past summer. Most importantly, the school is designed to support learning and gatherings of all kinds. Grade 6-8 students joined their older schoolmates in various activities. The Senior School was also host to the KCS Gala in May.

New partnerships included The Boulevard Club and the Argonaut Rowing Club as offsite facilities to support our physical education program. We also secured a dedicated KCS bus that supports our place-based learning and serves as a daily shuttle for students commuting to and from the Junior School or subway.

The KCS Path Program continued, with every student playing a lead role in their learning on the topic of their choosing. Our other distinct co-curricular program, KCS By Design, had all students engaged in a committee of their choosing and playing a lead role in shaping the school experience in academics, arts, athletics, citizenship, and spirit.

Once again, on behalf of the entire school community, we thank Father Michelle, Father Andrew, Ran Kim and the members of the Corporation, including Janet Kincaid, for continuing to work to promote a positive relationship between KCS and St. George's on-the-Hill.

After 34 years of continuous growth and strength in our educational programming and school campuses, we are preparing to mark our 35th year during the 2023/24 school year. We are excited for you to be a part of it as we look forward to the final phase of the Senior School construction that will begin in the spring of 2024, renovations to the JK-Grade 3 outdoor playground in the summer of 2025, and new technology and instruments. On behalf of KCS, we wish all members of St. George's on-the-Hill a happy and healthy 2024.

WARDENS' REPORT

A Strong and Resilient Community

2023 was another challenging year as the impact of the senseless Russia/Ukraine war continued, and the unrest in the Middle East that led to the Israeli/Hamas war, intensified. This unstable geopolitical climate has resulted in significant loss of life, serious injuries and homelessness to thousands more, and economic hardship and suffering around the globe.

While we at St. George's on-the-Hill are not immune to the global economic challenges, we continue to be a strong and resilient parish. We have been blessed with the resources to maintain and expand our parish ministries and outreach programs, all of which have been made possible through the support and dedication of our parishioners, staff and clergy.

We were all saddened by Father Michelle's resignation as Incumbent of St. George's on-the-Hill, effective December 31, 2023, after serving in this capacity for nine and a half years. We also welcome Father Andrew as our Interim Priest-in-Charge, while the Parish Selection Committee undertakes the process of identifying a new incumbent. We pray that God will guide us throughout this transition and help us to build on the solid foundation that we have had for almost 180 years. "God is with us, we're not afraid."

2023 Activities

Worship

2023 has been the first full year of uninterrupted in-person worship since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic at the beginning of 2020. From January to June and September to December our 10:30 Sunday Services were held in person and livestreamed, as were the Wednesday Church by Candlelight services.

Music remains an integral part of our worship and we are blessed with an excellent Music Ministry here at St. George's on-the-Hill. Under the leadership of Ran Kim, our Director of Music, an amazing church concert was held on May 7th. We were also treated to a wonderful Christmas concert on December 3rd.

A special Jazz Eucharist was held on Sunday, November 5th at the 10:30 service with music provided by Colleen Allen and her jazz ensemble. This was a wonderful service and very positive feedback was provided by those in attendance.

Communities within St. George's Community

We're indeed fortunate and blessed to have many faithful and talented parishioners who participate in communities/groups that contribute immensely to our Outreach Programs by giving of their time, talents and offerings. These groups include the following: Prayer Shawl, Mary and Martha's Kitchen, Faith Formation, Pints of View, Family Friday (formerly Messy Church), Youth Group, Heritage and Archives Committee, Acolytes, Coffee Hour, CHaNT (Community, Hospitality and Newcomers Team) and the Communications Committee. At our Welcome BBQ last September, many of these groups took the opportunity to set up stations informing interested parishioners about the vital volunteer services they provide to the St. George's community.

We also thank Derek Logan, the Head of School at Kingsway College School, the entire school staff and its board of directors for the excellent relationship that we continue to enjoy with them.

2023 and 2024 Initiatives

Capital

- In 2023 we continued to review and develop design requirements for the Luxton Hall level Servery (kitchen) replacement and washroom upgrades. We retained Larkin Architects (Diocese recommended consultants) to review our proposal and provide preliminary drawings for discussion and budgeting. With the help of David Dougall and Anatoli Guelfgat (our facilities manager), we assembled an initial budget for consideration. We look forward in 2024 to evaluating the recommended budget and our immediate servery and washroom needs. This project will require significant capital fundraising which got a kick-start in the fall with the Time, Talents and Treasures auction organized by a group of parishioners led by Max Maréchaux. Approximately \$9,000 was raised from this event. In the meantime, we also appreciate the efforts by Mary-Anne Rodgers in keeping our servery organized and tidy.
- The stained-glass window frames in the church were all painted and caulked, and the sills replaced in summer of 2023.
- Garden update: We established a direction to refresh the garden along the south side of the church, adjacent to the Drennan – Bailey Garden. With the financial assistance of the Drennan bequest, it was decided that we would initiate a Community Garden with a view to addressing and contributing to local food insecurity. A local landscape architect was retained to provide an overall design to re-develop the space. This was presented to the Parish Advisory Council and then issued to trades for quotations. The existing garden was cleaned up, removing old shrubs and weeds, after which we constructed the raised planter bed and added new soil. We trust that by now everyone has seen this progress! For spring 2024, we look forward to establishing a Community Garden Team to develop a strategy for planting and maintaining our new garden. We will also start installing an irrigation system and adjacent proposed garden shrubs.
- Rectory: The gutters at the rectory needed repair and the cost of leaf removal was increasing significantly. As a result, we decided to replace the existing gutters and to install “leaf guards” to reduce maintenance.
Our tenants advised us that the washing machine was not operating properly and caused problems. A new machine was purchased to avoid unnecessary repair bills.

Outreach

Throughout 2023, our parish, parishioners, individuals and the St. George’s Outreach Fund supported many outreach initiatives, as the urgent needs of the most vulnerable groups in our community and beyond continued to increase. The following are some of the recipients of your outreach contributions:

- A \$7,000 donation to St. Margaret New Toronto Anglican Church to assist with repairs to their elevator.

Communication

Finally, a key component of our communication at St. George's is the interaction among parishioners and others through gatherings such as coffee hour, Contemplative Prayer, Wednesday Faith Formation, pancake dinners, Mary and Martha's Kitchen gatherings, Family Fridays (formerly Messy Church) and Pints of View.

YOUTH GROUP REPORT

The Youth Group continues to be a strong and vital force at St. George's. It currently consists of 30+ young people and includes youth between the ages of 11 and 19 with frequent visits by our young adult alumni. Whether it be through social conversation, board games, supporting faith formation or children's programming, our Youth Group has proven its ability to combine fun and exciting recreational activities with service projects, social justice awareness and outreach activities that reach out into our community and beyond.

In the past year, the Youth group continued to be involved in social service projects such as Street Patrol, where youth group members prepared lunches and delivered them on the streets of Toronto to those facing housing and food insecurity. The youth group was also involved in successful food, clothing and hygiene drives for local shelters and support services for women and children.

Within the Parish, you will see the Youth and Children of the parish acting as readers and acolytes on the first Sunday of every month. You will also have seen them involved in the organization of the Welcome BBQ and supporting the delivery of Messy Church (now Family Friday) and Children's Programming.

The Youth Group helped deliver Lenten and Holy Week programming, including this year's Pancake Supper, the Good Friday services, and the Easter Vigil.





The Youth Group was also instrumental in running the annual Easter Egg Hunt which in 2023 saw more than 1000 eggs hidden in the cemetery and around the church. In the fall, the Youth Group and Church Kids family planned Church in the Orchard, which involved a Eucharist and apple picking in a local apple orchard with our families.

Nowhere is the commitment of our Youth, Young Adults, Children and Families on better display than in the Christmas Pageant. In 2023, the Youth Group created a brand-new Christmas pageant from scratch! This year's production was a Christmas pageant called "Into the Multiverse" which combined modern pop culture and music with the Christmas story. The Youth Group, led by James Noronha and Veronica Kitchen, created the new production that included everything from Barbie, Marvel Superheroes, Mario Brothers and Paw Patrol in a retelling of the Christmas Story for all ages. The production included parents, kids, youth, parishioners and volunteers involved as actors, costumers, directors and producers. Altogether, more than 50 people were involved in this year's pageant.

Finally, the Youth of St. George's have been instrumental in ensuring the continuation of online and virtual services. Youth group members have been trained on the use of our audiovisual and streaming equipment and are involved in the weekly production and delivery of church services on Wednesday and Sunday as well as ensuring that special events and concerts are broadcast to our community.



You will also catch Youth Group members in the weekly readings and prayers of the people, and in services such as Remembrance Day, the annual Indigenous Day of Prayer and Pride Celebrations. We are deeply grateful for their continued involvement in ensuring the ongoing success of parish programming.

We would like to thank everyone at St. George's on-the-Hill for their guidance and support. Thanks to you, our youth have become a wonderful example of faith through action, and we give thanks for their continued support and participation in the life of our parish.
